INTRODUCTION

This document comprises a Community Development Plan for the community of Labasheeda in County Clare and its immediate environs. it has been developed through a seven month (September 2019 to March 2020) facilitated, consultative process in which the actions proposed have been informed by the needs, interests and concerns of those living in the area. The final wrap up meeting was not held due to the Covid 19 pandemic, however progress was made by phone and email.

The process of developing the plan was led by a group of local volunteers who worked closely with a facilitator whose role was to guide and mentor the planning process. The members of the planning group were as follows:



The planning process was enabled by the Clare LEADER Programme under the management of Clare Local Development Company.

This is a framework plan that outlines broad priority actions to be implemented over the next three years to improve life quality and community experience of the people of Labasheeda. It is community led, evidence informed and realistic in its aspirations. Though this plan reflects the priorities in 2020, it provides a template for future plans and can be viewed as a work in progress.



Labasheeda



Labasheeda village is in the civil parish and Electoral Division of Killofin and the Catholic parish of Kilmurry McMahon. The village is described in the County Development Plan as follows: 'Labasheeda takes its name from the Irish, Leaba Shioda, which can mean either Sheedy's Bed or 'the silken bed' and is situated on the banks of the Shannon Estuary. The village has a small harbour from which a ferry used to operate across the Shannon from Labasheeda to Tarbert. This was at the time when Labasheeda traded with Limerick. The picturesque village affords outstanding views of the Shannon Estuary to the south of the main street. Views are also afforded of the Kilkerrin Peninsula and Mountshannon Wood. The land is flat to the north and immediate rear of the main street and gradually rises up behind the village providing an attractive, rural backdrop. The village is served by a primary school, community centre and a number of public houses. Labasheeda is connected to the West Clare Regional Water Supply and there is sufficient capacity to cater for the population target. Labasheeda has no public wastewater treatment apart from Mountshannon Estate, which is served by its own system. The remainder of the village is served by individual septic tanks or discharge direct to the foreshore. The EPA Code of Practice for Wastewater Treatment Systems must be strictly adhered to in the absence of a public wastewater treatment scheme in order to ensure no significant long term effects on the River Shannon or the adjacent European sites. The provision of a wastewater treatment system by Irish Water will be subject to the constraints of Irish Water's capital investment programme and new connections policy. Labasheeda adjoins the Lower River Shannon Special Area of Conservation (SAC) and River Shannon and River Fergus Estuaries Special Protection Area (SPA). Future development must ensure that there are no adverse effects on the SAC's and SPA's site integrity, or the integrity of any other European sites as a result of the proposed development.

Labasheeda is privileged to have a number of community groups engaged in a range of activities that have a very positive impact on the community. A comprehensive list of community groups and contact information is in Appendix 4.

According to the community survey carried out between October and November 2019², in which over a third of the residents responded (128 out of the 2016 CSO population of 328 persons), the people of Labasheeda appreciate its scenic location, sense of community, it's size, safety and peacefulness, it's school, post office, shop, pub and, that it's a well kept village. On the other hand, residents have indicated that life in Labasheeda would be improved by more shopping facilities, the development of the Quay, an increased use of the community centre, a café or other food service, increased public transport, the restoration of derelict buildings and the development of walking, running and cycling trails.

Community Profile

Labasheeda is located in the Local Electoral Division (LED) of Killofin. The Census data from this LED is used to provide an indicative profile of the community. The following is a summary of the 2011 and 2016 Census results from this LED. The full report is in Appendix 3.



Population

• The population of Labasheeda as per Census 2016 is 328 individuals. This represents a 1.5% decrease in population since the 2011 Census – a total of 5 individuals. The population has

diminished by 16.54% in the 20-year period 1996-2016. The population dropped by 17.8% in the six year period between 1996 and 2002, and has remained relatively consistent since.

- The division of male:female is approximately 53:47, with a total division of 173 males to 155 females in the community.
- Children aged under 14 years account for 19.5% of the overall population (slightly lower than national average of 21%) while those aged 65+ comprise 22% (considerably higher than the national average of 13%).
- 95.5% of the population identifies itself as White Irish.

Deprivation

Following the 2016 Census, Labasheeda is described as disadvantaged, as per the Pobal HP Deprivation Index of levels of advantage or disadvantage.

Households

- As per Census 2016, 84% of Labasheeda's population is living in owner occupied accommodation.
- 12% lives in rented accommodation. Just under 6% of the population is living in accommodation rented from the Local Authority.
- Married couples with children comprise 30% of all individuals living in private households.
- Married couples without children comprise a further 22% while people living in one-person households account for one in four of the population (26%).
- Lone parent households comprise just under 10% of the population
- 186 permanent dwellings identified in 2016 Census; 65% of dwellings in use on Census night but 35% vacant.

Education

Census 2016 shows that:

Proportion Primary Education Only	24.5%
Proportion with Third Level Education	18.38%

Employment

- Practically no change in the number of people at work between 2011 and 2016, though decrease in numbers of unemployed (n=6; 25% decrease).
- Unemployment rate for males in 2016 is 13.77% and 21.4% for females.
- 19% growth in the number of retirees between 2011 and 2016.
- Just under 2% of the population unable to work due to permanent sickness or disability.
- Approximately one in five persons (22.22%) involved in Agriculture and Forestry in 2016 and 21.5% in Professional Services.



Commuting

• Considerable amount of travel to work or school is local with 68% of 2016 respondents commuting less than ¾ of an hour.

Persons with a disability in 2016:

- Male = 22, Female = 17
- Percentage of overall population = 11.9%
- Number of full time carers = 20.

Labasheeda Community Development Planning Process


Following an initial Expression of Interest from a number of community activists to the Clare LEADER programme, a four-phase process was undertaken in the preparation of this Community Plan:

- 1) An Orientation Phase: This phase involved an initial meeting with representatives of all of the community organisations active in Labasheeda. This group agreed to participate in a planning group to work with the facilitator to prepare the content of a community survey. It was decided to wait until the survey results and the development of a proposed plan was completed before calling a public meeting.
- 2) An Information Gathering Phase: The planning group agreed the final format of the questionnaire and how it would be distributed and collected. Both an online and paper format was used³. The survey was widely publicised and promoted and distribution (and some collection) was done by hand by the members of the Planning Group. The Church, Post Office, National School and Casey's Shop were used as collection points. The survey asked the wider community to identify strengths, needs, interests and concerns from their respective experiences of Labasheeda, and to name three actions that would improve life, which could be addressed in the emerging community plan⁴.
- 3) A total of 128 individuals from across the life cycle responded to the survey (28 online respondents) and the gender breakdown was Male: 50, Female: 67 and not specified: 11, and the age profile of respondents was as follows:

- 4) Analysis of Information and Action Planning Phase: The planning group reviewed the collected surveys and the facilitator prepared a report on the results. A list of possible actions emerged, of which a number had been acted on and developed prior to the survey by the various community groups. Once the priority actions were proposed, the Planning Group organised a public consultation meeting to present these actions to the community.
- 5) Public Meeting: The public meeting was held on the 16th of February and there was a very good attendance. The Planning Group presented the proposed actions and these were well received, with an additional action for consideration.
- 6) Response to the Public Meeting: At the follow up meeting on 10th March 2020 actions were clarified by the Planning Group and timelines and supports needed to help their implementation were identified. It was agreed that the best structure to implement the plan was to create an umbrella group comprising representatives from each community group with a voluntary co-ordinator/secretary to record decisions and arrange meetings. Each community group would take responsibility for an action appropriate to their particular remit. A number of people were identified as representing a wide range of sectors and groups and these were invited to the planning meeting where it was agreed to establish the umbrella group; Labasheeda Together, later changed to Labasheeda le Chéile.
- 7) Writing Phase: This involved the preparation, agreement and finalisation of this document as the core output of the planning process: the Labasheeda Community Development Plan.



Operational Structure

Voluntary work is well organised in Labasheeda. Many of the groups have achieved a lot of success in developing excellent projects and events, such as the highly regarded Dan Furey Weekend, organised by the Community Centre Committee. The ICA Committee provides a lot of community activities and support for funerals and social occasions. The Tidy Towns Committee ensures that the village is very attractive, leading it to be considered 'the Jewel in the Crown' of the Shannon Estuary Way. The Projects Group have already achieved much with the Kilkerrin Battery and Cycle routes actions and





have researched funding streams as well as establishing good working relationships with Clare County Council and CLDC.

An important outcome of this community planning process is to bring the various community groups around Labasheeda together to act as one voice for the overall development of their community and to liaise with funding, planning and tourism authorities.

Three studies were completed recently on the tourism potential for the Estuary area and they point to the importance of local communities working together to produce a range of tourism products and experiences based on the unique natural and heritage assets of the Estuary and River Shannon.

These reports identified the importance of working with neighbouring communities, such as Ballynacally and Kildysart, on the development of tourism in the area.

It was agreed by the planning group that it would best suit their community's needs to create an umbrella group to co-ordinate and communicate the activities of all the groups in Labasheeda and to liaise with funding, planning and tourism agencies and with neighbouring communities.

The umbrella group will be composed of representatives of each community group operating in and around Labasheeda. Each community group will continue to manage its own projects, and individual groups will take on the implementation of actions in the community plan that are appropriate to their skills and remit. It will be the function of the Umbrella Group to co-ordinate and share information about the delivery of the actions identified in the plan. The name chosen for this group is Labasheeda le Chéile.

Labasheeda le Chéile will co-ordinate the implementation and future development of this community development plan. Core responsibilities in relation to this role are as follows:

- Overseeing delivery of the community development plan
- liaising with community groups
- Providing information to the local community on community activities






- Liaising with funding, planning and tourism agencies

Labasheeda le chéile will be an Unincorporated Body with Articles of Association and will meet 4 times a year to co-ordinate activities and get updates on the progress of the Community Plan. As the





current strands and actions are delivered, Labasheeda le Chéile will agree other actions to be implemented. This current community plan is designed to be used as the community plan template for future strands and actions.

The meetings will be chaired by Manus McGee who will also represent the group at meetings with agencies. Labasheeda le Chéile meetings will be organised and recorded by Liam Woulfe and Lourda Bermingham will develop and maintain communication between the groups and the local community through an online and printed newsletter that will give regular updates on the development and delivery of the actions in the Community Development Plan. Other promotional platforms will include the Parish Notes in the Clare Champion, Facebook, Twitter, posters in the local shop and pub. All the community groups will undertake to use their own networks and media outlets to support each other and promote their events and activities.

1. Population and Population Change



The population of Labasheeda as per Census 2016 is 328 individuals. This represents a 1.5% decrease in population since the 2011 Census — a total of 5 individuals. The population of Labasheeda has diminished by 16.54% in the 20-year period 1996-2016. The population dropped by 17.8% in the six year period between 1996 and 2002, and has remained relatively consistent since.

The division of male:female is approximately 53:47, with a total division of 173 males to 155 females in the community.


2. Population by Age

Dependents are defined for statistical purposes as people outside the normal working age of 15-64. Dependency ratios are used to give a useful indication of the age structure of a population with young (0-14) and old (65+) shown as a percentage of the population of working age (15-64) (https://www.cso.ie/en/releasesandpublications/ep/p-cp3oy/cp3/aad/)

In 2016, the age dependency ratio for Labasheeda was as follows (as per Pobal Maps) 44.05% for Labasheeda compared to a national average of 53% (CSO). Children aged under 14 years account for 19.5% of the overall population (slightly lower than national average of 21%) while those aged 65+ comprise 22% of Labasheeda's population (considerably higher than the national average of 13%). There are 89 children and young people aged under 18 years in Labasheeda, comprising 27% of the population. Therefore, approximately one in four people is a young person under 18.






3. Population by Nationality & Ethnicity

Population by Nationality










The Pobal HP Deprivation Index is the main index used in Ireland to identify levels of disadvantage and deprivation as well as identifying areas with the highest concentrations of disadvantage. It classifies areas according to levels of advantage or disadvantage on a scale of;

Extremely disadvantaged; Very disadvantaged; Disadvantaged; Marginally below average; Marginally above average; Affluent; Very affluent; Extremely affluent.

Following the 2016 Census, Labasheeda is described as disadvantaged. Certain small areas of Labasheeda are defined as marginally below average. These include areas such as Lakyle North and South; Kilkerin; Colmanstown; Knockphuteen; Mountshannon East and West; Killofin and Ballina. The following small areas in Labasheeda are identified as disadvantaged: Cullenagh; Labasheeda; Clonkerry East and West; Slievedooley and Moyfadda.

6. Private Households by Type



Labasheeda vs Private households by type






